Parent Guide to Student Achievement (PGSA) Based on Parents' Bill of Rights - SB 49; Session Law 2023-106

This guide serves as a valuable resource providing parents with insights into their child's education. It offers an overview of academic standards, curriculum and research-based teaching strategies, as it aims to strengthen the partnership between parents and educators ultimately contributing to the success of all students.

	Information and Resources
How can my child be promoted to the next grade level?	In order to be promoted to the next grade level, Wilmington Preparatory Academy (WPA) students are expected to meet or exceed proficiency on local assessments of state standards and state standardized tests. Appropriate grade placement decisions are also based upon the mastery of critical knowledge and skills including reading, writing, and mathematics. The whole child is considered when making promotion decisions. Therefore, social/emotional needs and physical development are also considered. Final placement decisions are made by the Head of School, with input from teachers, parents and students (as practicable).
What is my child learning at school? How can a parent review these materials?	In North Carolina, all public schools use the same Standard Course of Study, determined by the State Board of Education. These standards are the knowledge and skills students should understand by the end of each grade/course. The standards can be found on the NCDPI Office of Academic Standards <u>website</u> . Relevant standards for WPA's curriculum include: Mathematics English Language Arts Science, and Social Studies

	Wilmington Preparatory Academy and teachers determine how to teach these standards, including curriculum, textbooks, and supplementary materials.
	Parents of WPA students can learn more about our curriculum by attending our Curriculum Night and Parent/Student Orientation in the Fall as well as Open House sessions in the winter.
How will a parent learn about my child's progress in school or with a class?	WPA shares progress of students through a variety of ways. Progress reports (every 4.5 weeks) and reports cards (every 9 weeks) are sent to parents in order to communicate student academic strengths and any areas for improvement. Feedback on conduct is also provided through personal emails and phone calls.
	Local Assessments: WPA uses the mCLASS literacy assessment three times per year to measure reading achievement and progress in grades K-3. The school also uses iReady to measure progress in reading and math in grades K-8. Reports from these assessments may be sent home with report cards, and/or reviewed during parent conferences.
	State Assessments: Individual Student Reports for end-of-grade/course tests and other state assessments (English language proficiency assessment) are provided to parents at the end of each school year.
	In NC, all students take end-of-grade (EOG) assessments for reading and math in grades 3-8. Students take EOG science assessments in grades 5 and 8. An Individual Reading Plan (IRP) will be developed for any in third grade demonstrating difficulty with reading. An IRP will have specific strategies/ideas that can also be supported at home.

How can I learn more about the challenging academic programs available to my child?	 Wilmington Preparatory Academy offers a variety of options for students to pursue their interests and strengthen their academic skills. In particular, the Academy offers rising nine graders a wide range of high school options including Early College. Early Colleges: The aim of the Early College model is to graduate students who earn a high school diploma as well as two years of transferable college credit or an associate degree all at no cost to their families. The target population for early colleges is first generation college-goers, those seeking a challenging, more rigorous curriculum, or other historically underserved populations.
What school choices are available for my child?	 Charter Schools Charter schools are public schools of choice that are authorized by the State Board of Education and operated by independent non-profit boards of directors. State and local tax dollars are the primary funding sources for charter schools, which have open enrollment and cannot discriminate in admissions, associate with any religion or religious group, or charge-tuition. Charter schools operate with freedom from many of the regulations that govern district schools, but charter schools are held accountable through the State assessment and accountability system.
